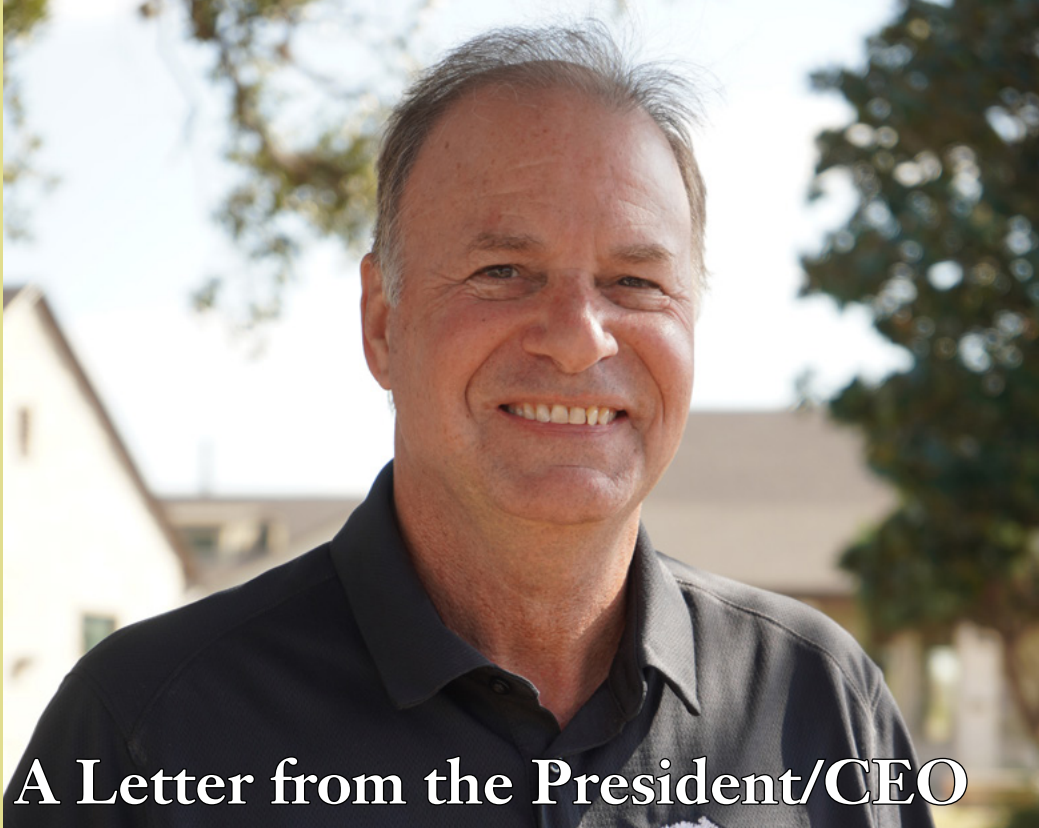

I loved when we used to go to the Trail of Lights. I want to go do that more. I like our Christmas programs and going every year. I'm not into presents, but I like Christmas here.



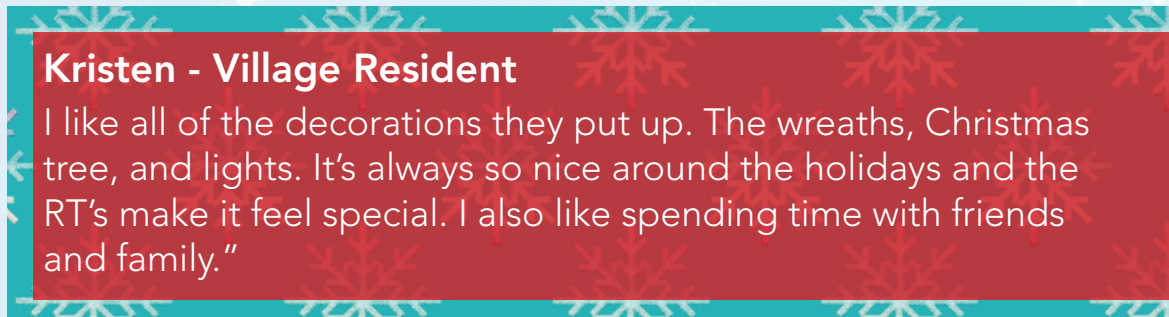
Molly - Ranch Resident

Hippotherapy Soars at Marbridge

Villa Residents Participate for the First Time at the Creed Ford III Therapeutic Riding Ranch

Marbridge continues celebrating milestones to ensure the safety, happiness, and well-being of our residents. Since the opening of the Creed Ford III Therapeutic Riding Ranch, a fire was reignited, and our team has been working hard to expand the equine program to meet more of the capabilities which Creed III envisioned. Residents at The Villa now benefit from Hippotherapy, a unique and effective therapy intervention driven by the collaborative efforts of the teams across campus.

"Hippotherapy is not a discipline, it is a treatment tool used by therapists to achieve their patient's functional goals in their daily lives by improving strength, balance, range of motion, and endurance," said Trish Johnson, Physical Therapist. "It takes a close partnership with our Therapy team and the Training & Education team." Trish and Amy Patton, Marbridge's Occupational therapists, have been trained by the American Hippotherapy Association.

"I am grateful to be a part of the Marbridge family and to be able to incorporate equine movement during therapy for our Villa residents. I have been rewarded by seeing the excitement and smiles on our residents as they achieve their goals," Amy mentioned while getting John, a Villa resident, ready to mount up.

With the Physical Therapy and Occupational Therapy sessions at the Creed Ford III Therapeutic Riding Ranch growing and thriving, we can build on the number of residents who can participate. MacKenna, another resident at The Villa, is new to the equine program and able to experience more in her life.

"MacKenna has always loved horseback riding. It is one of the best therapies to help balance her tone and make her more comfortable. She absolutely loves the horses," shared Cecilia, MacKenna's mom. "It makes my heart happy to see her back riding again. I love everything Marbridge does for the residents to make their lives happy and fulfilling."

Each resident requires at least four team members to assist in the therapy session. Someone to guide the horse, a therapist, and two people to hold and support the rider using specific safety equipment.

"This is still new; we are working it out," said Shonda. "The horses are still getting used to the different therapy tools, the noodles, the bat, the balls, the beanbags. We also must make sure that the horses are adjusted."

We are just coming out of the gate, opening services to more residents to give everyone who is interested the opportunity to experience the therapeutic benefits and the happiness that ensues.

The Perfect Match

How Two Sisters Found Marbridge and Their Story of Success

On behalf of our entire campus, we hope this year has been full of blessings and great things. Before I share more about one of our amazing residents, Kristin, I wanted to let you know that your gift will be doubled UP TO \$100,000 THIS HOLIDAY SEASON! This year, Marbridge has worked closely with some of our supports, who recognize how dire fundraising is during an election year, and have stepped forward to make sure Marbridge never misses a step.

Kristin (pictured here with her younger sister, Megan) has Down syndrome and moved to Marbridge in May of 2022 at age 54. Kristin lived with her family south of Philadelphia until the time that she moved to Marbridge, and in her youth, Kristin went to several schools focused on teaching students with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDDs) where she greatly enjoyed her classmates and participated in Special Olympics and all the other social and learning opportunities offered. Kristin graduated around the age of 20 from the highest level of education available for IDD students in the region, and then, she got a job as a mail clerk where she worked for over thirteen years.

While working full-time during her 20s and 30s, Kristin’s wonderful community of friends from school dwindled as people moved away and fewer social opportunities for her age group existed. As Kristin’s parents aged, they were less able to seek out and facilitate her participation in social outings, and as Kristin entered her 40s, she was leading a sedentary life consisting of lots of time watching tv and being alone in her room.

“Kristin moved in with me when our parents were no longer able to care for her. Her willingness to socially engage, level of physical activity, and overall health were in decline, and she had a strange jealousy towards my college aged daughter. As I helped Kristin get back on track and talked with her about her jealousy, I realized that what Kristin most needed and wanted was not to live with me, but she longed to live with friends and have a community of her own.”

Megan started researching options and became disheartened as she learned how few intentional community living options for adults with IDD existed in her region. Megan was also very concerned about what would happen if Kristin had any serious health concerns through the end of her life. All the living communities Megan found sent residents back to their families or into the greater community if health issues required any skilled care. After watching their mother spend the last months of her life in an understaffed nursing home during the pandemic, the thought of Kristin being in a similar environment where the staff wasn’t familiar with IDDs was her worst nightmare.

“When I found Marbridge online, with the vibrant community, beautiful campus, wide range of activities, and a full-service nursing facility on campus, it all just seemed too good to be true! As I learned more, I just had to see Marbridge for myself, and Kristin and I were on a plane to visit within a couple months. We both fell in love with Marbridge on that trip, and I felt so reassured after touring The Villa that Marbridge could meet Kristin’s needs no matter what sort of health situations arose.”

Since moving to Marbridge, Kristin’s physical, emotional, and social well-being have all improved immensely. She lives in The Ranch Dorm where she has loads of friends, and she enjoys taking a full class load. Kristin hasn’t been this independent and socially fulfilled in decades. Megan and her husband have also moved to the Austin area and enjoy the opportunity to be close to Kristin and be part the Marbridge community.

Kristin and her family are proudly apart of the Marbridge family. Due to such a passionate race leading up to the election, donors have reallocated their donations exclusively to support their candidates and non-profits around the nation are experiencing the worst “Presidential Pause” (meaning donations are not coming in during a strong election year) in history. CoAct Symposium is a Touchdown

Leaders from Across the Country in Awe of of Keynote Speaker

Founded by the Marbridge Foundation, the CoAct Project Symposium is a national executive symposium focused on best practices, challenges, and opportunities when caring for individuals with cognitive and intellectual disabilities. Marbridge hosted over 100 professionals and families from across the county who traveled to Marbridge from 22 different states for the three-day symposium.

The excitement was heightened with the arrival of the 2024 keynote speaker, Doug Flutie; the Heisman Trophy winner, NFL Alumni, CEO and Co-founder of the Doug Flutie, Jr. Foundation for Autism. Doug shared stories from playing college football and demonstrated some of his historic plays in the NFL.

During an engaging fireside chat, led by Becca McPherson, Vice President of Development, Doug answered questions from a standing room only audience.

“Doug and his family have been such an integral part of growing and advocating for the greater Autism community,” Becca commented. “I have such a high respect that they didn’t know much about autism before Dougie but recognized that it is a spectrum. They have set out to be a voice for every part of the spectrum and it was such an honor to chat with him on stage.”

Doug answered questions about his foundation, Dougie, his son and inspiration, and challenges within our field. He proved to be an informative and motivating speaker at the symposium and a great way to kick things off.

The CoAct Project Symposium covered a wide range of topics including changing perception and awareness of IDD, types of cognitive disabilities that affect people, medical education, integrating education, addressing barriers, and providing opportunities.

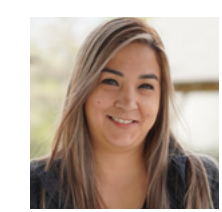
Premier Employees

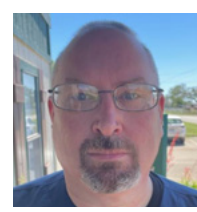

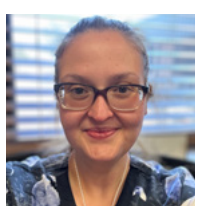
